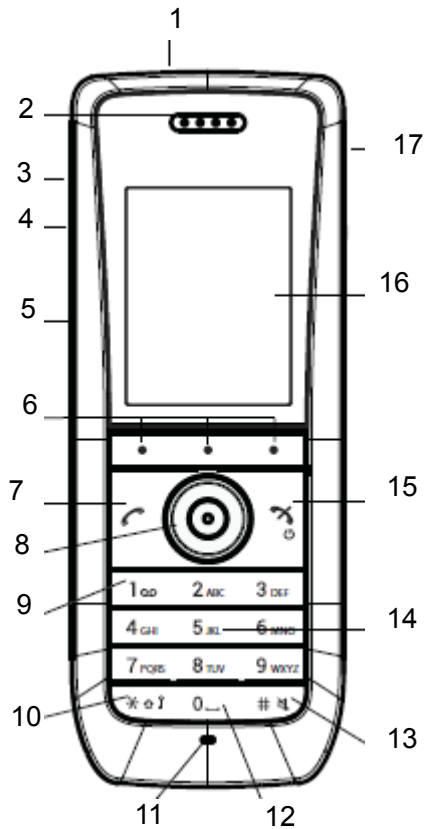

- DC3 Desktop charger: Charges the handset only. The charger is delivered with a plug-in power supply and connected to an ordinary wall socket.
- DP1 Desktop Programmer: Downloads new software and synchronizes parameters. The handset becomes fully operational when you keep it in a charger.

**\* Note:**

Use the charger within the temperature range of +5° C – +40° C.

## CR3 Charging Rack

The CR3 Charging Rack is used for:

- Charging several handsets
- Synchronizing parameters
- Downloading software

The built in power supply can charge up to six handsets.

## Battery pack charger

The battery pack charger is used for charging upto six spare batteries.

### Belt Clips

The two belt clip options are:

- Hinge-type clip: The clip on the back of the handset is used to fasten the handset to a belt or similar. The clip can also be changed to a swivel-type.
- Swivel-type clip: The ordinary belt clip can be replaced with a special swivel-type belt clip that is adapted to firmly place your handset onto your belt.

**\* Note:**

The handset can be used without any clip on.

### Security Cord

The security cord is 800 mm long and is attached directly to the handset.

### Carrying case

The carrying case is especially designed for the handset and comes with a swivel type belt clip. The handset is fully operational while placed in the carrying case.

### Headset

A headset is recommended if the handset is frequently used or the user want to have both hands free.

The headset comes in the following three versions:

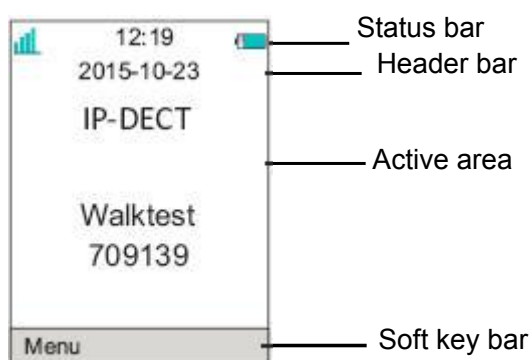
- Microphone integrated in the cable

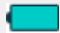










All functions and settings available to the user are shown as icons and text in the display. The icons and text in the display indicate functions and settings to which you have access. The display normally displays date and time, the Owner ID and telephone number. The Owner ID can manually be set by the user.

Name	Description
Status bar	This is the top row that is used for icons which provide information for signal strength, missed call, new message, phone lock, key lock, sound off, time and battery status. This row is always visible in all screens.
Header bar	This row displays the current date, headset connection, <b>Bluetooth</b> connection, and system connection.
Active area	This row contains information such as, profiles, the name of the system to which the handset is connected. A user identity provided from the system and/ or an Owner ID can also be displayed if configured in the <b>Settings</b> menu. This is also the area for pop up text for example, missed calls or to confirm an action.
Soft key bar	This row is used for soft keys that can be used as shortcuts for functions in the handset.
Scroll bar	This is the bottom row that is placed to the right side of the active area. It becomes visible when a menu screen has more than six menus, or if the complete text in a message cannot be displayed on the screen simultaneously.

	<b>Signal strength</b>	This icon is visible in the upper left corner. The staples shown in display depends on the signal strength.

	<b>Loudspeaking</b>	This icon is displayed in the soft key bar during a call. Pressing this icon turns on the loudspeaker.
	<b>Loudspeaking off</b>	This icon is displayed after the soft key for <b>Loudspeaking</b> icon has been pressed. Pressing this icon turns off the loudspeaker.
	<b>New message</b>	Also known as <b>Interactive message</b> , this icon indicates that a new text message (or messages) has arrived. The icon remains in the status bar until all new messages in the inbox are read.
	<b>Request for answer</b>	This icon in front of a message indicates that this message must be acknowledged or rejected.
	<b>Voicemail message</b>	This icon is displayed in the status bar when there are voicemails. The icon remains until voicemail has been listened to.

	<b>Off-hook key</b>	This key is used for connecting calls. One short press in standby mode opens the call list.
	<b>On-hook and On/Off key</b>	This key is used for disconnecting calls and returning to main screen. A long press in standby mode switches the handset on or off.
	<b>Navigation/Confirmation Key</b>	This key is used to step in the menu and when working in text mode. The picture on the left shows how to press the navigation key to step left or right and up or down in the menu. The navigation key can be programmed. <b>Up</b> is by default a shortcut to the <b>Inbox</b> and <b>Down</b> is a shortcut to <b>Call contact</b> . During a call the volume can be increased or decreased by pressing up and down on the navigation key.

## In call

The **In Call** menu displays a list of functions that can be accessed during a call. You can view the available functions by pressing the **More** soft key. Some functions are always provided and others may be made available by the administrator via the WinPDM/Device manager. To use a function, navigate the **In Call** menu to highlight the required function and then press the **More** soft key.



 **Note:**

When you make a call from a locked handset, the system displays limited functions in the **In Call** menu. When you make a call from an unlocked handset, the system displays the entire menu.

## Additional In Call functions

Besides the default **In Call** functions, up to 10 extra system specific codes or general purposes can be defined.

# Chapter 4: Basic operation

---

## Switching the handset on

### Procedure

1. Press and hold the **On-hook and On/Off** (  ) key.  
The handset vibrates when it is on and the display lights up followed by a confirmation message.
2. Press **Yes**.


---

## Switching the handset off

### Before you begin

The handset must be in an idle mode.

### Procedure

1. Press and hold the **On-hook and On/Off** (  ) key.  
The system displays the Switch off? window.
2. To confirm, press **Yes**.  
If a handset is shared and one of the users logs off the shared handset, the lock that prevents the handset from unauthorized use is deactivated.

---

## Log in or out of a shared phone

### Note:

The shared phone functionality is applicable in IP-DECT systems only.

More than one user can use the handset with the shared phone feature. When a handset is configured to be a shared phone, it can be used by any shared phone user in the system. The message and call lists are deleted when a user logs off a handset.

If the handset is configured in the WinPDM or Device Manager, an emergency call can be made from a handset that is logged off.

---

## Logging onto a handset

The handset must be switched on.

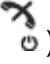

The handset is in idle mode or rings.



## Procedure

Long press the **Sound off** (# ) key or the **Mute**  button.

The status of the handset changes between ring signals on or off. The  icon indicates a silenced handset.

# Locking and unlocking the keypad

---


## Locking and unlocking the keypad in idle mode

### About this task

Use the following procedure to lock the keypad and prevent pressing the keys accidentally.

### Procedure

Lock the keypad during a call.

1. To lock the keypad, press the **Key lock, and Upper and Lower case** (\* ) key.

Press and hold this key for a few seconds until the **Lock** soft key appears.

2. Press the **Lock** soft key.

Unlock the keypad during a call.

3. To unlock the keypad, press the **Key lock, and Upper and Lower case** (\* ) key.

The system displays the message `UnLock?.`

4. Press the **Yes** soft key.

### **Note:**

You can answer an incoming call or press an alarm button when the keypad is locked. If the WinPDM or Device Manager has an emergency call configured, you can make an emergency call when the keypad is locked.

---

## Locking and unlocking the keypad during a call

### About this task

Use this procedure to lock the keypad during a call and prevent pressing the keys accidentally. This is useful when a headset is used and the handset is attached to a pocket or a belt.

## Procedure

Lock the keypad during a call.

1. To lock the keypad, press the **Key lock, and Upper and Lower case** (\* ↕ ¶) key.  
Press and hold this key for a few seconds until the **Lock** soft key appears.
2. Press the **Lock** soft key.

Unlock the keypad during a call.

3. To unlock the keypad, press the **Key lock, and Upper and Lower case** (\* ↕ ¶) key.  
The system displays the message `UnLock?`.
4. Press **Yes**.

### \* Note:

During a call, the **Volume** button and **Alarm** button can be pressed while the keypad is locked.

Depending on the model of the handset used, you can press the **Alarm** button also.

---

## Locking and Unlocking the handset

### About this task

The handset can be protected for unauthorized use. If this function is activated, a PIN code has to be entered, for example, to switch on the handset, to answer an incoming call etc. The default phone lock code (0000) can be changed to any 4 - 8 digit personalized code.

### Procedure

3. Select **Locks**.
4. Select **Phone lock**.
5. Select **Auto phone lock**.
6. Select **On**, **On in charger**, or **Off**.

### \* Note:

You can define a handset with predefined emergency numbers that can be called while the handset is locked.

**\* Note:**

Depending on the model of the handset, you can use an **Alarm** button.

The **Lock** function is deactivated when a one of the user logs off the shared phone.

---

## Muting ringtone for incoming call or message

### About this task

You can mute the handset ringtone on an incoming call or message. The call is not hung up when the ringtone is muted. If the call is unanswered, it will revert to voicemail if the handset has been configured for voicemail.

### Procedure

Press the **Sound off** (# ) key or the **Mute** () button while the handset is ringing.

# Chapter 5: Configuring Bluetooth Headset

---

## Introduction to Bluetooth

The **Bluetooth** technology replaces the cord between the cordless handset and the headset. This allows the user to move more freely and eliminates the risk of a headset cord getting stuck.

The **Bluetooth** is factory mounted on the circuit board of the cordless handset.

The **Bluetooth** supported functions are:

- Pair the cordless handset with it's headset.
- Choose which device to use when making a call.
- Play ring signal in the **Bluetooth** headset.
- Answer and connect sound to the **Bluetooth** headset when answering with the button of the headset.
- End call using the button of the **Bluetooth** headset.
- Transfer audio to or from **Bluetooth** headset during a call, using the menu in the cordless handset.
- Increase or decrease the volume in the **Bluetooth** headset with the volume buttons on the cordless handset.

---

## Wear

For optimal performance wear the **Bluetooth** headset and the handset on the same side of your body. You can achieve the best audio quality in the headset when there is no obstruction between the headset and the cordless handset.

---

## Headsets

A number of **Bluetooth** headsets for different work situations have been tested together with the handset.

Since the **Bluetooth** supports the **Bluetooth** 2.0 standard, other headsets may also work although not verified by Avaya.

**\* Note:**

Your **Bluetooth** headset may have more or less functions than described here.

---

## Operation

Step between the menus with the navigation key. Confirm each menu selection by pressing the soft key **Select**.

---

### Enabling a Bluetooth connection

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **Bluetooth**.
4. Select **Enable**.

The system displays the `Bluetooth enabled message`.

The system displays a **Bluetooth** (  ) connection icon in the header bar.

---

### Disabling the Bluetooth connection


#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **Bluetooth**.
4. Select **Disable**.

The system displays the `Bluetooth disabled message`.

## Pairing or Connecting bluetooth headset

### About this task

To use a **Bluetooth** headset, pair it first with the handset. It is only needed to pair the **Bluetooth** headset once. A paired **Bluetooth** headset is automatically connected, as indicated by the  icon in front of the headset.

### Procedure

1. Set the **Bluetooth** headset in pairing mode.
2. Enable **Bluetooth**.
3. Press **Menu**.
4. Select **Connections > Bluetooth**.
5. Select **Headset**.
6. Select **Add new**.

The system displays the Put headset in Pairing mode message.

7. Press **OK**.

The system searches for a **Bluetooth** headset connection.

8. When headset is found, press **Pair**.
9. **(Optional)** Enter the PIN code.

10. Press **OK**.

If the pairing is successful, the system displays Successful pairing. The **Bluetooth** headset is connected and indicated by the **Colored square** (  ) in front of the headset.

11. To add another headset, perform steps 1–6.

Upto 8 headsets can be paired to the handset, but only one headset at a time can be selected. The system displays the paired headsets by a default name in the handset menu **Headset**.

---

## Selecting a Bluetooth headset

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **Bluetooth > Headset**.
4. Select a headset by pressing up or down on the navigation key.

5. Press **Select**.

The system displays the message: `Connection successful` is displayed.

The headset is selected.

When a new headset has been selected any previous headset automatically gets disconnected.

---

## Removing a headset

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **Bluetooth > Headset**.
4. Select a headset by pressing up or down on the navigation key.
5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Delete**.
7. Press **OK**.

---

## Changing the name of Bluetooth headset

### About this task

The name in the headset list of the headset is the default name for the headset. Use this procedure for changing the name of the **Bluetooth** headset.

### Procedure

1. Select **Connections**.
2. Select **Bluetooth > Headset**.
3. Step with the navigation key, ▲ or ▼ to select the headset.
4. Select **More > Edit name**.

---

## Changing the headset profile

### About this task

Use this procedure to select an appropriate headset type to achieve optimal audio quality.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.

2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **Headset**.
4. Select one of the following :
  - **Mic on boom**: Optimizes audio.  
This option is the default setting.
  - **Hearing protection**: Reduces the noise exposure level and the risk of hearing loss.
  - **Customized headset profile**: Is visible if the headset profile is configured in WinPDM or Device Manager.
5. Press **Select**.

---

## Calling

---

### Making a call

#### Procedure

1. Dial the number on the handset.
2. Press **Call** or the **Off-hook** key.  
The system displays `Transfer call to phone? message`.
3. Do one of the following:
  - To use the **Bluetooth** headset, press **No** or ignore the message.
  - To use the handset, press **Yes**.

---

### Answering a call

#### About this task

A ring signal sounds in both the selected bluetooth headset and the handset to signal an incoming call.

#### Procedure

Do any of the following:

- To answer the call in the bluetooth headset, press the button on the headset.
- To answer the call in the handset, press **Off-hook** key.



---

## Ending a call

### Procedure

Do any of the following:

- To end the call in the bluetooth headset, press the button on the headset.
- To end the call in the handset, press the **On-hook** key.

---

## Volume and Mute Control

---

### Adjusting the volume during a call

#### Procedure

On the upper left side of the handset, press **Volume up** to increase the volume and **Volume down** to decrease the volume.

 **Note:**

Depending on the **Bluetooth** headset it might be possible to adjust the volume directly on the headset.

---


### Turning microphone on or off during a call

#### Procedure

Turn the microphone off.

1. To turn the microphone off, do the following:
  - a. Press **More** during the call.
  - b. Select **Microphone off**.
  - c. Press **Select**.






The icon  indicates a silenced microphone. This means that the other party in an ongoing call cannot hear you.

Turn the microphone on.

2. To turn the microphone on, do the following:
  - a. Press **More** during the call.

- b. Select **Microphone on**.
- c. Press **Select**.

You can also turn the microphone on and off by long pressing the **Sound off** (# ) key or the **Mute** () button. A short beep is also heard indicating that the microphone is turned on or off.

When you press the **Mute** () button in a PTT call, no beep is heard.

---

## Messaging

When you receive a text message during an ongoing call, a beep sounds in the bluetooth headset.

---

## Transfer a call

#### About this task

Use this procedure for transferring a call to the handset while you are on a call with the **Bluetooth** headset.

#### Procedure

2. Select **Audio transfer**.

Use this procedure for transferring a call to the **Bluetooth** headset while you are on call with the handset.

#### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Audio transfer**.

---

## Switching to a headset with a cord

### Before you begin

You must be on a call.

### Procedure

To transfer the call to the headset automatically, connect the headset with a cord.

---

## Operation Notice



### Accessibility and voice quality

The base network is not always available. If you cannot connect with your system, contact your system administrator. For best voice quality, avoid positioning near computer, radio or similar equipment.

### Operating area

You can only use your cordless handset in the area that is covered by your system. Outside this area, you will lose contact with the system. The signal strength icon will be low and *Searching* is displayed.

### Out of Range

When you leave the system's coverage area a short beep will sound and *Searching* is displayed. The out of range beep is repeated every minute for 30 minutes. The sound can be turned off by long pressing the **Sound off** (# ) key, or .

When re-entering the coverage area it can take a couple of minutes before the handset automatically has registered into the system.

---

- User ID.

5. Press **Next**.

If you do not enter the system name, the default name is used. For example, System A, System B.

7. Press **Next**.
8. Enter **PARK code** (max. 31 digits). The PARK code is not required if there is no alien DECT system within the coverage area.
9. Enter **AC code**. The AC code length must be between 4 - 8 digits.
10. Press **Next**.

The system displays the `Protection on?` message.

11. To protect the new system, select **Yes**.

 **Note:**

You cannot delete a protected system using the **System** menu. The unsubscription must be made using the **Admin** menu or the DECT system.

12. Press **OK**.

A searching mode starts.

## Unsubscribing the system

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **System**.
4. Select **Unsubscribe**.
5. Select the system to unsubscribe.

6. Press **Yes**.

---

## Renaming the system

### About this task

Use this procedure to change the name of the system in the handset.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **System**.
4. Select **Rename system**.
5. Select the system to rename and press **Edit**.
6. In the **Name** field, enter new name.
7. Press **Save**.

---

## Setting priority

### About this task

The default order of priority is the order of entered subscriptions. This means that the first subscribed system has the highest priority. You can edit the priority list and set the systems in priority by moving them up or down in the list.

This priority list is used in combination with the system set to **Automatic**.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **System**.
4. Select **Priority**.
5. Change the priority by using the navigation key to scroll up and down.
6. To save the priority, select **Back**.

---

## In charger action when in call

### About this task

Use this procedure to define the functions of a handset when placed in a charger during a call.

## Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **In charger**.
4. Select **Call behavior**.
5. Select any of the following:
  - **No action**: No action is performed when the handset is placed in a charger during a call.
  - **Loudspeaking**: The loudspeaker is activated when the handset is placed in a charger during a call.
  - **End call**: The call is disconnected when the handset is placed in a charger.

---

## In charger action when not in call

### About this task

Use this procedure to define the functions of a handset when the handset is not on a call and not placed in a charger.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Connections**.
3. Select **In charger**.
4. Select **Other actions**.
5. Select any of the following:
  - **No action**: No action is performed when handset is not in call and placed in charger.
  - **Change profile**: When the handset is placed in the charger it changes profile. When the handset is removed from the charger, the profile is changed back.  
  
Press **Edit** to select the wanted profile. By default only the profile Normal is visible, and additional profiles are visible only if they are configured.
  - **Switch off**: When the handset is placed in the charger it will switch off. When it is removed from the charger it will switch on again.  
  
If you enable the handset restrictions, the handset might not be switched off when placed in a charger.
  - **Sound off**: When the handset is placed in a charger it is muted. When the handset is removed from the charger it switches the sound on again. When the handset is switched off in the charger, the system displays the Owner ID of the handset. This simplifies the identification of the handset. For example, when the handset is being charged with other handsets.

If you enable the handset restrictions, the handset might not be muted when placed in a charger

- **Logout:** When the handset is placed in a charger it is logged off. Call list and message list are deleted when the handset is logged out. When it is removed from the charger, the user needs to log in again.

This feature is applicable in IP-DECT systems only.

- **Message absence:** When an application or system sends a message to a handset, it receives an indication that the handset is absent. If a handset is absent, the application or the system determines if the message is sent to the handset or not, or redirected to another handset.

If a message is sent from a handset, it does not receive an indication that the recipient is absent. This function must be programmed in the PBX to be able to redirect calls or messages.

You can configure additional **In charger** actions.



# Chapter 6: Menu operation

---

## Managing incoming calls

---

### Incoming call

You get a call alert that is accompanied by a ring signal and / or a vibrating handset.



You can disable a ring signal and a vibrator. The handset number or name of the calling party is shown. The name is shown if the handset number of the calling party is stored in the local phone book.

---

### Answering a call

#### Procedure

Do one of the following:

- Press the **Off-hook** () or the **Accept** soft key.
- Press  to answer the call using the speakerphone.
- Press the headset button to answer the call using the headset.

The name or number of the calling party is displayed if calling line information is available.

#### **Note:**

- When you enable **Automatically**, all incoming calls are connected automatically.
- If you decline the call, you can still acknowledge its receipt by sending a predefined text message to the caller.

---

### Declining a call

#### Before you begin

Your handset must ring.

## Procedure

Press the **On-hook and On/Off** (  ) key or the **Decline** soft key.

---

## Ending a call

### About this task

Some systems or PBXs require that the handset sends a DTMF in order to end a call.

### Procedure

To end a call, press the **On-hook and On/Off** (  ) key.

---

## Declining a call with a predefined message

### About this task

To decline a call with a predefined message, both the caller and the call receiver must be connected via an IP-DECT system.

### Procedure

1. In response to the “Reply with a message template?” message prompt, press **Yes** to send a message to the caller.

A list of predefined messages is displayed in the **Templates** menu.

2. Select a predefined message and, if required, edit the message.
3. Press **Send**.

The handset displays the callers number.

4. Press **Send** again to send the message.

The handset displays the `Message sent` confirmation when the message is sent to the caller.

---

## Answering a text message with a predefined message

### Procedure

1. Press the soft key **Reply**.
2. Press the **More** soft key.

The **Templates** option is displayed.

3. Press the soft key **Select**.

A list of predefined message template is displayed.

4. Navigate to the required message template and press the **Select** soft key. If required you can edit the message.

5. Press the soft key **Send**.

The message sender's number is displayed in the handset display.

6. Press the soft key **Send**.

A "Message sent" confirmation is displayed and the message is sent to the caller.

---

## Managing call list

---

### Call list

You can see the last 25 received, dialled, or missed calls that are stored in the call list. If a phone number occurs more than once, the last time stamp and the total number of occurrences are listed. From the menu, you can see call list under **Calls > Call list**.

---

### Editing a number from the call list

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call list**.
4. Select a number from the call list.

You can scroll the call list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.

5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Edit number** to edit the selected number.

---

### Saving a number from the call list

#### About this task

Saving a number in the call list creates a new contact. However, existing items in the call list are not updated with the contact information.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call list**.
4. Select a number from the call list.  
You can scroll the call list using the navigation key up and down.
5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Save number**.

---

## Sending a message from the call list

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call list**.
4. Select a number from the call list.  
You can scroll the call list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.
5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Send message**.

---

## Deleting entries from the call list

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call list**.
4. Select a number from the call list.  
You can scroll the call list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.
5. Press **More**, and then do the following as required:
  - To delete an entry: Select the entry to delete, and then press **Delete > Yes**.
  - To delete all entries: Press **Delete all**.

## Viewing missed calls

### About this task

By default the system displays the Missed call window and the **Missed calls** (  ) icon.

The dialog window that appears for a missed call can be turned off. The handset can also be prevented from storing calls in the call list. The **Call list** can be used to ensure privacy for users sharing the same handset. These features require configuration in the handset via **WinPDM** or **Device Manager**.

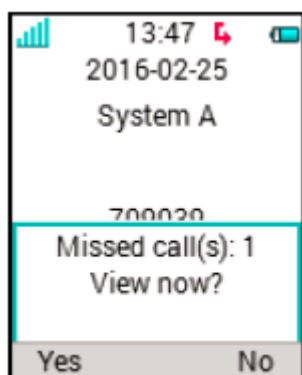


Figure 3: Missed calls

### Procedure

The system displays a Missed call window and the **Missed calls** (  ) icon.

1. To view the missed calls, press **Yes**.

The user presses **No**.

2. Press **Menu**.
3. Select **Calls > Missed calls**.
4. To scroll in the list, press up and down on the navigation key.
5. To call back, press **Call**.
6. **(Optional)** In a **Call list**, press **More** to view the time and date of the call, edit the received number, add to contacts, and delete the received number.

If supported by the system, the numbers contact name is displayed in the list.

---

## Viewing the time of a call

### Procedure


1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls > Call list**.
3. Select a number from the call list.  
You can scroll the call list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.
4. Press **More**.
5. Select **Time of call**. The time and date is displayed for the selected number.

 **Tip:**


The duration of the last call is displayed under **Call time**.

---

## Push-to-talk group call

The **Push-to-Talk** feature is a group or conference call made to members of a predefined group . If one of the group members wants to contact the others, the member must press and hold the **PTT** button  to open the microphone. You can configure the **Multifunction** button to serve as the **PTT** button.

Because the multifunction button is larger than the **PTT** button and located on top of the handset, the user can locate it easily. The smaller **PTT** button is at the side of the handset. Specifically, users who need to wear gloves find the **Multifunction** button easier to use than the **PTT** button.

Some legacy systems or PBXs require that the handset sends a predefined DTMF tone when pressing or releasing .

To participate in the conference, the group members must first accept the invitation received as an incoming call. If a member declines the invitation, the member can rejoin the group or conference later. A member can also invite a group of members to participate in the conference call by calling a PTT group.


The support for the **Multifunction** button depends on the model of the handset used.

## Accepting a PTT invitation as an incoming call

### About this task


Use this procedure to accept a PTT invitation as:

- An incoming call
- An incoming call during an ongoing call


A PTT invitation received as an incoming call is indicated by the **Push-to-talk** () icon.

## Procedure

Accepting a PTT invitation as an incoming call:

1. Press **Accept** or the **Off-hook** () key.

By default, the handset starts in the inverted mute and loudspeaking modes, but you can configure it differently in a PTT group.

2. To open the microphone for transmitting, press and hold the **Push-to-talk** () button. When you release the **Push-to-talk** button, the microphone is muted again.

The **Multifunction** button can also be configured to function as the **Push-to-talk** button.

Accepting a PTT invitation as an incoming call during an ongoing call:

3. Press **Accept**.

The system disconnects the ongoing call and connects to the PTT call.

## Accepting a PTT invitation as a message

### About this task

Use this procedure to accept a PTT invitation that you receive as:

- A message
- A message during an ongoing call


When you receive an invitation, the system sends a warning signal before disconnecting the current call and connecting to the PTT call. A PTT message can contain up to 1000 characters.

### Procedure

Accepting a PTT invitation as a message.

1. Press **Accept**.

Depending on the configuration of the invitation, the handset accepts the invitation automatically, and relays the message in inverted mute and loudspeaking modes.

2. To open the microphone for transmitting, press and hold the **Push-to-talk** () button. When you release the **Push-to-talk** button, the microphone is muted again.

Accepting a PTT invitation as a message during an ongoing call.

3. Press **Accept**.

The system displays the message.

## Configuring a PTT call to connect directly

### About this task

Use this procedure to connect to the PTT call directly when you receive the PTT invitation as:

- An incoming call during an ongoing call

- A message during an ongoing call

### **Procedure**

To disconnect from the ongoing call and connect to the PTT call directly, ensure that:

- You have configured the handset to answer invitations automatically.
- You do not reject the invitation within 10 seconds.
- The invitation has higher priority than the ongoing call.

## **Declining a PTT invitation**

### **About this task**

Use this procedure to decline a PTT invitation received as:

- An incoming call
- An incoming call during an ongoing call
- A message
- A message during an ongoing call

### **Procedure**

When you get an incoming call:

1. Press **Decline**.

The handset returns to the previous screen .

When you get a message:


2. Press **Reject**.

## **Calling a push-to-talk group**

### **Before you begin**

Define PTT groups.

### **Procedure**

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls PTT groups**.
3. Select a PTT group.
4. Press **Call** or the **Off-hook** () key.
5. **(Optional)** In the idle mode, press the **PTT** button quickly, select a PTT group, and then press the **Call** button.



## Rejoining a push-to-talk group

### About this task

When you reject or miss the PTT invitation that you receive as a call or a text message, then you can rejoin the PTT group by dialling:

- The **Call list** or **Missed calls**.
- Selecting the message from the **Messaging** inbox.


### Procedure

You have received a PTT invitation as a call.

1. Rejoin the PTT group by dialling the **Call list** or the **Missed calls**.

The system displays the PTT invitation as a **Push-to-talk** () icon.

You have received a PTT invitation as a message.

2. Rejoin the PTT group by selecting a message indicated by the **New message** () icon in the **Messaging** inbox.
3. Press **Call**.

---

## Managing calls in absentia

---

### Call services

These functions are system dependent. Besides the default **Call services** functions, 10 extra system specific call services can be defined with or without automatic disconnection. The parameters are set up in the Portable Device Manager (WinPDM).

---

### Absence handling

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call services > Absence**.
4. Select the applicable absence reason in the list. The number of absence reasons (for example: "Lunch", "Meeting", "Trip", etc.) are configured in the WinPDM.

The code is defined when configuring the absence reason in the handset.

5. Press **Select**.
6. Enter time (HHMM) or date (MMDD) depending on the selected absence reason.
7. Press **OK**.

The handset sends an absence reason code to the system by establishing a call. The call is automatically disconnected after a few seconds.

---

## Deactivating the Absence settings

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call services > Absence**.
4. Select **Deactivate**.
5. Press **Select**.

---

## Diverting calls

### About this task

You can divert internal calls, external calls, calls when busy, and calls on no reply to another phone number.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Calls**.
3. Select **Call services > Divert calls**.

You can create a shortcut to the **Call services** function or activate a call service when a profile is activated.

You can set the PBX settings for the call diversion to show the **Divert calls** menu in the handset.

4. Select **Activate**.
5. Select any of the following:
  - **Internal** or **External**: Diverts internal or external calls.
  - **No reply**: Diverts calls on no reply.
  - **When busy**: Diverts calls when the handset sends a busy tone or is on another call.
6. Enter the number (maximum 24 digits) to which you want to divert the calls. Alternatively, press the **Call Contact list** (**\*[Call Contact List]**) to see the call contact list.

7. Press **OK**.

The handset sends a diversion reason code to the system by establishing a call. The call is automatically disconnected after a few seconds.

The code is defined while configuring the diversion reason in the handset.

### Next steps

To stop diversion, select **Deactivate** and press **OK**.

---

When you call from a locked handset, there are limitations to what items in the **In Call** menu are visible. However, the entire menu is accessible when calling from a handset with locked keypad.

## Adjusting the volume during a call

### About this task

Use this procedure to increase or decrease the volume during an ongoing call.

### Procedure

Do the following:

- To increase the volume, press the **Volume up** button.
- To decrease the volume, press the **Volume down** button.
- To adjust the volume using a navigation key, press up or down on the navigation key.

The handset stores and keeps the new volume level.

## Opening contacts during the call

### About this task

Use this procedure to open contacts while you are on a call.

### Procedure

1. Select **More**.
2. Select **Contacts**.
3. To open the contacts, select any of the following:
  - **Call contact**: For searching a local or company phone book contact.
  - **Central phonebook**: For searching a central phone book contact.
4. Press **Select**.
5. Select or search contact.

The selected contact can be called by pressing **Call**. When calling the contact, the first call is put on hold.

## Opening messaging during the call

### About this task

Use this procedure to open the **Messaging** menu during an ongoing call.

### Procedure

1. Select **More**.
2. Select **Messaging**.


## Turning microphone on or off during a call

### Procedure

Turn the microphone off.

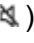

The icon  indicates a silenced microphone. This means that the other party in an ongoing call cannot hear you.

Turn the microphone on.

  - a. Press **More** during the call.
  - b. Select **Microphone on**.
  - c. Press **Select**.

You can also turn the microphone on and off by long pressing the **Sound off** (# ) key or the **Mute** () button. A short beep is also heard indicating that the microphone is turned on or off.

When you press the **Mute** () button in a PTT call, no beep is heard.

## Transferring the audio

**Audio transfer** is visible if **Bluetooth** connection is active.

Use this procedure to start a new call during an ongoing call.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **New call**.

3. Press **Select**.
4. Enter the number that you want to call or press the **Call Contact list** (•☎) icon to access the phonebook.
5. Press the **Off-hook** (📞) key.

When the new call connects, the first call is put on hold.

## Calling back

### About this task

When a call is made to a busy handset, automatically a callback can be made when the busy handset is free. Use this procedure, when you get a busy tone sound.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Call back**.
3. Press **Select**.
4. Press the **On-hook and On/Off** (📞) key and wait until the handset alerts.
5. When the handset alerts, press the **Off-hook** (📞) key.

The call starts automatically.

## Transferring a call by pressing a key

### About this task

Use this procedure to transfer the first call with the second call when you have two ongoing calls.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Transfer**.  
The **Transfer** option is visible only when it is configured in the handset.
3. Press **Select**.

This connects the first caller with the new caller. Your call is automatically disconnected.

## Transferring a call by dialing a number

### About this task

You this procedure to transfer an ongoing call to a new call.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Transf. to new**.

**Transfer to new call** is visible only when **New call** and **Transfer** are defined in the handset.

3. Press **Select**.
4. Enter the number of the person where the ongoing call is to be transferred or press the **Call Contact list** (•📞) icon to access the phone book.
5. Press the **Off-hook** (📞) key to transfer the call.

## Starting a conference call

### About this task

Use this procedure to initiate a conference call between several participants simultaneously.

### Before you begin

A new call is started during the conversation.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Conference**.
3. Press **Select**.

The person initiating the conference call is the conference leader, and the others are participant members of the conference call.

## Toggling between calls

### Before you begin

Start a new call.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Switch**.

The **Switch** option is only visible if it is configured in the handset.

3. Press **Select** to switch to the other call.

## Ending a call

### Before you begin

A new call has been started during a conversation.

### Procedure

1. Press the **More**.
2. Select **End Call**.

The **End Call** option is visible only when it is configured in the handset.

3. Press **Select**.

The handset ends the current call and resumes the previous call.

## Sending call waiting

### About this task

Use this procedure to notify the engaged party that another call is trying to reach them.

### Procedure

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Call waiting**. The **Call waiting** function is visible, only if the administrator has activated in the handset.
3. Press **Select**.

The engaged party receives a **Call waiting** signal.

When the line is free it automatically calls the number again. This is system dependent function.

## Answering call waiting

### About this task

Use this procedure to answer call waiting when you:

- Receive a short tone for another incoming call during an ongoing conversation.
- Receive a beep from the handset and a text display: **Internal call** for internal callers and **External call** for external callers. The handset also displays the name or the phone number of the second caller.

### \* Note:

You can use **Answer call waiting** function in two different ways depending on the system setup and configuration.

### Procedure

During a call, you receive a short tone. To answer the second call, do the following:

1. Press **More**.
2. Select **Answer call waiting**.
3. Press **Select**.

You connect to the new call and the first call is put on hold. When the line is free, the call on hold is automatically dialled again. This is a system dependent feature.

During a call, you receive a beep and a text display. To answer the second call, do the following:

4. Press **Accept**.

The system displays the text `Switch` briefly and transfers to the second call. The first call is put on hold.



- To end the call with the second caller, press **More > End call**.

You disconnect with the second call and connect with the first call.

- (Optional)** Press **Decline** to reject a second call.

The second caller hears a busy tone, and the call is logged as a missed call in the handset.

## Enabling DTMF

### About this task



Some systems or PBXs require that the handset sends Dual Tone Multi Frequency (DTMF) when pressing the keys. Use this procedure to enable the **DTMF**.

### Before you begin

You must be on a call.

### Procedure

Do the following:

- Press **More > DTMF > Select**.
- Press the **On-hook and On/Off** () key, and then press and release the **Sound off** () button.

**DTMF** is visible only when it is configured in the handset.

## DECT Info

DECT info is an advanced function intended for an administrator using the handset to measure RF link and system parameters as part of a troubleshooting or site surveying procedure.

This option is only visible if the **Admin** menu is activated.




## Using the loudspeaker

### About this task

Use the procedure to activate the loudspeaking function.

### Procedure

Do any of the following:

- Press a **Multifunction** button, **Soft** key, **Hot** key, or a **Navigation** key and define it as a shortcut to a **Phone call** () function. When you press a key or a button, a predefined number is called. The support for a **Multifunction** button, depends on the model of handset used.
- When receiving a call, press the soft key . The **Soft** key might have another or no function depending on its configuration of the **In call** function in WinPDM or Device Manager.
- During a call, press the soft key . The **Soft** key might have another or no function depending on its configuration of the **In call** function in WinPDM or Device Manager.

- During a call, put the handset in a charger. Requires that the **Loudspeaking** function is chosen in the **In Charger** menu.
- This function can also be activated by selecting another answering method, that is, **Automatically** and or **Loudspeaking**.

## Sending data

### About this task

Sent data can be used to initiate actions such as:

- Opening a door.
- Starting and stopping a machine.

### Procedure

To send user entered data from the handset, do any of the following:

- Press pre-programmed hot key.
- Press pre-programmed soft key.
- Select a service.

The data can either be predefined, entered after the hot key or soft key is pressed, or send when the relevant service is selected.

## Managing contacts


---

### Contacts

The handset has a local phone book with 250 entries, where you can add, delete, and edit names and numbers freely. The phone book lists all names in alphabetical order, where you can add three numbers for each contact: work number, mobile number, and other number.

You can also access a central phone book which is system dependent. You can send a request to a messaging server with the first characters entered, and the messaging server returns a list of names and numbers that matches the search.

In addition, a company phone book with up to 1000 entries can be downloaded to the phone via the WinPDM.

You can download a company phone book through the PDM. It is not possible to edit or delete a company phone book contact. These contacts are indicated by the **Locked entry** () icon before their name. The contacts will include only the work number.

When searching for a contact, the input language can be temporarily changed by long pressing the **Key lock, and Upper and Lower case** (\* ⇄ ℒ). This can be used to temporarily access characters in a foreign language.

## Calling a number from contacts

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Contacts**.
3. Select **Call contact**.
4. Select a contact from the list, or search a name or number by entering the characters in the **Search** field.
5. Press **Call** or the **Off-hook** (☎) key.

If you create a shortcut to the “Phone Call” function, you can add a variable/character “U” in the “Enter Number” field that allows users to enter additional numerical characters before calling the number.

9. Select **Control question** and press **Select**. It is disabled by default.

If the control question is enabled, a dialog box is displayed when you press the defined soft key. The dialog box displays the following message: Press "Yes" to proceed.
10. Press **Save**.

## Managing messages

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### Mini Messaging

Depending on the model of handset that is used, it can receive text messages with a maximum of 12 characters. When a text message is received, the message alert signal sounds. The message is displayed in a popup window.

 **Note:**

The support for this feature is dependent on the model of handset that is used.

If the received message contains more than 12 characters, the remaining characters are discarded. Only the last received message is displayed. For example, a first message is received and displayed in the popup window. Another message is received and is displayed instead of the prior message which is discarded.

Press **Close** when the message has been read. It is not possible to reply to a message or create and send a new message. The messages are not stored in the handset.

---

### Message List

The thirty last received messages are stored in a list. The message list is located in the **Messaging** menu **Inbox**. Time and date information is included in the message. If a message is received when the inbox already contains thirty messages, the message in the inbox with the oldest time and date is automatically replaced by the newly received message.

---

### Inbox

#### Reading a stored message

##### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** to view the message list.
4. Select a message, and then press **View**.

You can scroll the message list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.

#### Replying to sender

##### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.

3. Select **Inbox** to reply to the message.
4. Press **Reply**.
5. Write your message, and then press **Send**.
6. **(Optional)** If required, edit the number to the receiver and press **Send**.

## Deleting a message

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** to view the message list.
4. Select a message that you want to delete, and then press **More**.  
You can scroll the message list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.
5. Select **Delete**, and then press **Yes**.  
The system deletes the message.
6. **(Optional)** To delete all messages in the list, select **Delete all** and press **Yes**.

## Forwarding a message

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** to view the message list.
4. Select the message that you want to forward, and then press **View**.  
You can scroll the message list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.
5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Forward**.
7. **(Optional)** If required, write additional text.
8. Press **Send**.
9. Enter the number of the receiver or press the middle soft key to open the phonebook.
10. Press **Send** to forward the message.

## Calling the sender of the message

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox**.

4. Select a message.
5. Select **View**.
6. Press **More**.
7. Select **Call Sender**.

## Calling while reading a text message

A user can make a call while reading a text message to review and discuss the message with the called party. The called party may be either:

- The message sender, that is, the same party that sent the text message.
- A different party.

The user can activate the loudspeaker function during the call to make it easier to read the received text message while talking to the called party.

## Calling a different party

### About this task


Use this procedure to call another party to read and review a received text message.

### Procedure

1. Open the message and press the **More** soft key.
2. From the pop-up menu, navigate to the **Call** menu item and press the **Select** soft key. The pre-dial screen is displayed. Enter the number of the party to be called or select a number from the handset call list or local or central phone books.
3. Press the **Call** soft key and wait for the called party to reply. The message is replaced by the ongoing call detail. The user can do any one of the following:
  - Continue with the call without referring back to the received message.
  - Redisplay the message and continue the call to further review and discuss the message.
  - Redisplay the message and terminate the call.

## Calling a number in a message

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** to view the message list.
4. Select a message, and then press **View**.
5. Do any of the following:
  - a. Press **More**, and then select **Call no. in text**.

6. If the message contains several numbers, then select the number that you want to call from the list.
7. Press **Call** or the **Off-hook** (📞) key.

**\* Note:**

If the sender has written a number in the message, the number can be called without dialling. This option is only visible if the number consists of minimum 3 digits.

## Saving a number in a message

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** to view the message list.
4. Select a message, and then press **View**.
5. Press **More**, and then select **Save number**.
6. Select any of the following:
  - **Work number**
  - **Mobile number**
  - **Other number**
7. Press **Add**.
8. Enter the name for the contact, and then press **OK**.
9. Press **Save**.

## Message templates

Predefined messages contained in message templates can be used in a number of different situations to quickly construct a message rather than having to construct the message completely from scratch. Up to five predefined messages can be configured for the handset in the **WinPDM/Device Manager**. This lets the user select and send a message appropriate to the current situation, such as "I am in a meeting" or "I am in the operating theatre".

Before a message is sent, the user may edit, add, or remove text from the message. For example, the message "I am in a meeting" could be appended with " - please call back after 1500".

The message template function can be used in the following contexts:

- When a call is received that the user wishes to decline, but still acknowledge with a message, without having to type a completely new message.
- When a text message is received that the user wishes to answer with a text message without having to type a completely new message.
- When the user is writing a message using the handset Messaging function without having to type a completely new message.

## Accessing templates

### About this task

Use this procedure to access a template.

### Procedure

1. Open the **Templates** menu as described in the context in which the template is being used.
2. Select the required message from the **Templates** menu.
3. To edit the message, use the handset navigation key to move to different parts of the message, the handset key pad to add additional text, and the **Clear** soft key to delete unwanted text.

## Write and send a message overview

A message can be constructed from scratch, or from a predefined template that can be used as it is or edited. The maximum message length is normally 160 characters but may be less depending on the character set used. The first character entered is always upper-case, followed by lower-case character. However, this may be overridden by pressing the \* -key before entering the character.

When pressing a key, the first available character for that key is displayed. To enter the other characters supported by the key, press the key until that character appears in the display.

The keys 0-9, \* or # can be used. Keys 0 and 1 contains special characters. For example, to enter the character **E**, press key 3 twice. **E** appears in the display and is selected after a timeout or when another key is pressed.

### + Tip:

If the system supports UTF-8 character encoding, the input language can be changed temporarily by long pressing. This can be used to temporarily access characters in a foreign language.

To delete a character, press **Clear**.

## Writing a new message

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Write new message**.
4. Write the message from scratch or select a message template by pressing the **More** soft key and, if required, edit the message.

### \* Note:

The **More** key is not displayed if no message templates have been defined.

5. When the message is complete, press **Send**.
6. Enter the call number.



7. Press **Send** to send the message.

---

## Sent messages

### Reading a sent message

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Sent** to view the list of sent messages.
4. Select the message that you want to read.

You can scroll the message list with the up and down arrows on the navigation key.

5. Press **View** to read the message.

### Forwarding a sent message

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox** or **Sent**.
4. Select message.
5. Press **More**.
6. Select **Forward**.
7. Press **Send**.
8. Enter the number.
9. Press **Send**.

---

## Received messages

### Receive a message


When a text message is received, the message alert signal sounds. The **New message** icon, and the content of the received message are automatically displayed. The icon remains in the display until all new messages are opened. If the message is received during a call, a beep notifies the user.

#### **Note:**

If the phone is locked with a PIN, the user must unlock the phone to access a received message.

Using the handset soft keys and menu selections, a received message can be replied to or forwarded to another party. The sender of the message can be called and a call number can be included in the message text. While reading a received message, the user can return to the **Inbox**, review the current inbox content and then return to the message being read. A received message can be read later by selecting **Close**. A received message is stored in the **Inbox**.

## Receive a message with request for an answer


In the status bar, a message with request for answer is indicated the same way as an ordinary message. In the message list, the message with request for answer is indicated by the  icon.

## Accepting or rejecting a message

### Procedure

Press the **Accept** or **Reject** soft key.

The option **Delete** is not available for a message with request for answer. An unacknowledged message can only be deleted from the message list.

When an acknowledged message has been replied to, the icon **Read message** () is shown in the message list. The text **Accepted** or **Rejected**, and time and date is also added in the acknowledged message.

## Reviewing inbox content while reading a message

### Procedure

1. While reading a received message, press the **More** soft key.
2. Select **Inbox** from the pop-up menu.

The system displays the inbox containing message summaries.

3. Press **Back** to return to the message you were reading.

---

## Enhanced messaging

### Message queuing and message priority

To notify you about new incoming messages, all incoming messages are placed in a message queue. The sorting order for the message queue depends on the system settings. By default, the messages are sorted first as per their priority and thereafter as per their arrival time.

The messages in the message queue are automatically displayed for 20 seconds until all the messages have been displayed. You can extend the time to display a message by pressing any button. You can also close a message to immediately see the next message in the message queue.

The messages that you do not close are put last in the message queue and remain in the message queue until you close them. They are shown as “**unread**” in the message list and will not be shown as “**read**” until you have closed them.

## Message priority and call priority

As per the default settings, the call information dialog box is always visible in front of a message on incoming calls. You can configure a message with a certain priority to ensure that it is always displayed without being interrupted by a call. When you configure a call priority, the handset compares the call priority with the message priority to determine which information to be displayed, that is, the call information dialog box or the message. If the message priority and the call priority are equal, then the message is displayed.

## Interactive messaging

**Interactive Messaging (IM)** is a function that extends basic messaging. It lets a handset user interact with a server application in the system.

An example can be machinery or equipment that can be accessed from the handset or a personnel calling application. A list of actions can be included in the message sent from the application to the handset.

### \* Note:

The support for this feature is dependent on the model of the handset that is used.

An IM is indicated and viewed the same way as an ordinary message. It is saved along with other messages in the message list.

### \* Note:

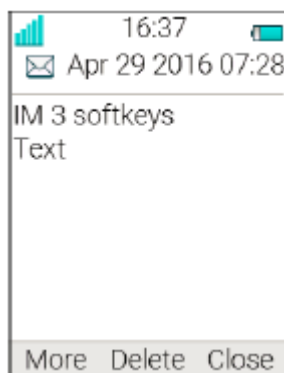
An IM is indicated and viewed the same way as an ordinary message. It is saved along with other messages in the message list.

When an IM has been read, the IM may display several options. Mark the one required and press **Select**. If the selected option requests input, enter the information needed and press **OK**. A press on the \* -key changes to digit or text input mode depending on whether it is digit or text format in the message. A read message is indicated the same way as an ordinary message.

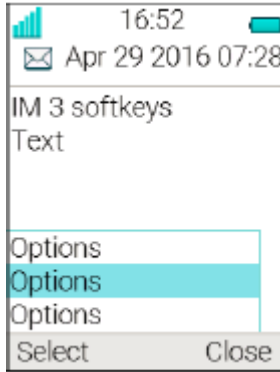
### \* Note:

If a handset receives an IM update when the original message already has been deleted, the handset automatically sends a negative acknowledge (NAK) to the system, if requested.

The options for an IM depends on the configuration in the client application.



## Menu operation

Mobile data from the handset can initiate the application to send the interactive message.

## Message indication repetition

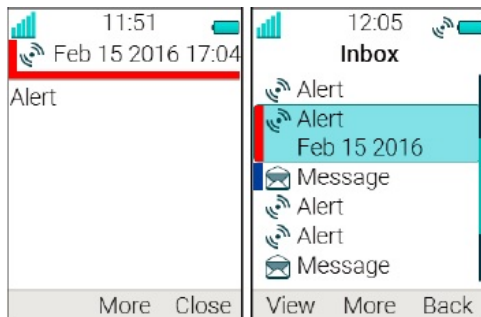
The handset can be configured to repeat the audio and visual message received alert. The alert repeats every seven seconds until the user reads the message or turns the alert off. Certain system-defined properties can be assigned to a message to give it a high priority, for example, an alarm priority message.

Alert repeats start automatically when a high priority message is received. Such messages do not need to be explicitly configured to trigger alert repeats. A high priority alert is repeated every 10 seconds for a maximum of 5 minutes and then the alert stops. Alerts continue to be repeated until the user presses the hook-on, mute button or soft key for accessing the message. Note that message indication repeat is a system dependent feature that cannot be activated from the handset.

## Color messaging

You can send color messages to handsets. The application that you use to send a message determines the color of the message. Color messaging is useful for categorizing messages.

In the following figure, there are two colored messages (a new message, and a read message) in the Inbox (left image in the figure). The messages are indicated by a gradient color bar behind the envelopes. In addition, a gradient color bar is shown below the envelop when reading a colored message (right in the figure).



**Figure 5: Examples of color messages**


## Redisplaying the message

### About this task

Use this procedure to:

- Redisplay the message while the call is ongoing
- Terminate the call and redisplay the message.

### Procedure

1. While the call in ongoing, press **More**.
2. Select **Messaging > Inbox**.  
The system displays the received message summary.
3. To display the message in full, press **View**.
4. **(Optional)** Use the four-way navigation key to scroll up and down a long text message to reveal the content while reviewing and discussing the message with the called party.
5. **(Optional)** To terminate the call and redisplay the message, press the **On-hook and On/Off**  key.

---

## Mobile data

### Sending mobile data

#### About this task

Mobile data can be used for:

- Opening a door
- Starting or stopping a machine

User entered data can be sent from the handset by pressing a pre-programmed **Hot** key or **Soft** key, or selecting a **Service**.

#### Procedure

Data can be predefined or entered only after you:

- Press the **Soft** key, the **Hot** key, or select a **Service**.

### Sending mobile data with a prefix

#### About this task

Mobile data with prefix can be used to send information to an application in the system.

The prefix is predefined by the user when programming the **Hot** key or **Soft** key or **Service**.

## Procedure

To send the mobile data from the handset, enter the data and then press:

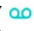
- A pre-programmed **Hot** key or **Soft** key, or select a **Service**.

---

## Voice mail

### Receiving a voicemail

#### About this task

When you receive a voicemail, it is indicated by the **Voicemail message** (  ) icon in the status bar, and the phone screen automatically displays the content of the voice mail notification.

Information is stored in the **Messaging** inbox until you listen to all the voicemail messages.

#### Procedure

1. To dial the voicemail, press **Call**.
2. **(Optional)** If you press **Close**, dial the voicemail by long pressing on digit key **1** in standby mode or from the **Inbox** menu.

### Checking the voicemail inbox

#### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Messaging**.
3. Select **Inbox**.
4. Select the voicemail message and press **View**.
5. Press **Call**.

Voicemail is displayed with one entry in the message list regardless of the number of voicemail received.

### One key voicemail access

#### Procedure

To access voicemail in the standby mode, long press the digit key **1**.

If the extension number is not available, the system displays the "Voice mail number not defined" message.

Some systems require that the mailbox extension number is downloaded to the handset.

---

# Managing profiles

---

## Profiles

Setting up customized profiles is useful when there are many users on the same handset and who want different sound profiles.

You can set your own customized profiles for:

- Incoming calls
- Message alerts
- Vibrating alerts
- Key sounds

You can also use customized profiles for temporary settings such as incoming calls must be silent while in a meeting.

You can switch between different profiles.

 **Note:**

Changing settings is not possible on a handset which is set to a profile. You have to leave the profile before.

You can access profile from the menu by selecting **Profiles > Select**.

## Adding a new profile

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Profiles**.
3. To add a new profile, select **Add new**.
4. Enter the name for the new profile, and then press **Save**.
5. To add settings to the profile, press **More > Add setting**.
6. Select the setting you want to add to the profile.  
Repeat steps 6-7 if you want to add additional settings.
7. **(Optional)** To add settings by importing from an available profile, press **More > Import from**, and then select the available profile.
8. Mark the required setting and press **Edit** to make the changes.

## Activating a profile

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Profiles**.
3. Select a profile from the list to activate it.

When a profile is activated, the **Profile active** (  ) icon and the name of the profile are displayed in idle mode.

## Deleting a profile

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Profiles**.
3. Select the profile that you want to delete, and then press **More**.
4. Select **Delete** from the menu, and then press **Yes**.

## Editing a profile

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Profiles**.
3. Select the profile that you want to edit, and then press **More**.
4. Select **Edit**.
5. Do one of the following:
  - Edit the setting by marking it and then press **Edit**.
  - Add additional settings by pressing **More**, and then selecting **Add setting** or **Import from**.
  - Remove a setting by marking it and then selecting **More** and then **Remove setting**.

---

## Alarm operation

The support for the system dependent features are dependent on the model of the handset used.

If a shared phone is used, it must be logged in to the system to be able to send alarm.

---

## Activating an alarm

### About this task

You can always trigger the alarm when you are speaking, editing your settings, or while the handset is locked.



## Procedure

To activate the alarm, press the alarm button twice within two seconds.

User can set a parameter through the **WinPDM** or **Device Manager**.

The system displays an information text `Personal alarm`.

The alarm is sent to the alarm central that distributes it further. After that the handset returns to stand-by mode.

---

## Acoustic location signal

An alarm can be followed by an Acoustic Location Signal (ALS). The ALS is a signal from the handset that sounds for a predefined period of time. The signal is silenced by pressing the **Mute** button on the handset.

---

## Testing the alarm

### Procedure

Press and hold the alarm button until the system displays the information text `Test Alarm`.

---

## Alarm with location information

Information about the handset's location can be sent along with an alarm. The location can be added as follows:

- Manually added by the user
- An approximately location given by the closest Base Station.

---

## Alarm with data

The data must manually be defined and stored by the user. To use the function, one Soft or Hot key or Navigation key in the handset must be defined as a shortcut to the menu **Edit alarm data**. The stored data is added to all types of alarm at transmission.

## Automatic call after alarm

A handset can be configured to call a predefined number after an alarm has been sent. If configured, it is also possible to call the predefined number without sending an alarm by pressing the push-button. Depending on the settings, the call can be established in the following modes:

- Loudspeaking mode
- Normal mode
- Monitor mode

---

## Procedure call

### About this task

When configuring the functions **Call services**, **In call** menu, **Contacts**, or a shortcut or service to the **Phone call** function, the data added in these functions is static. When entering the data for the function to be used, it is possible to add a variable or character U that allows the user to enter additional numerical characters before calling the number or sending the data to a system.

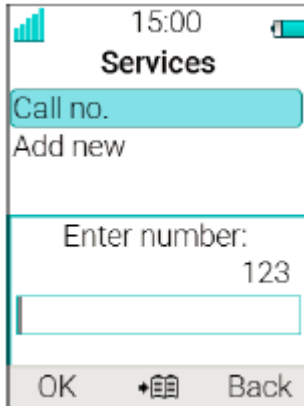
Example of configuration:

A user wants to create a service with the Phone call function. The PBX requires that a prefix must be added to a phone number. In this case, the user can pre-program the prefix and then enter the applicable phone number when using the Phone call function.

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**, or the confirmation button.
2. Select **My favorites**.
3. Select **Add new**.
4. In the Name field, enter **Call no** and press **OK**.
5. Select the function **Phone call**.
6. In the **Number** field, enter the prefix to be used followed by the character U. In this case, the text string is as follows \*21\*U. The character U represents an Enter number dialog where the user can enter the phone number.
7. Press **Save**.

When using the function, an Enter number dialog appears, see figure below. If the user enters **123** (or selects a contact with this number by pressing the **Call Contact list** (☎) and presses **OK**, the number \*21\*123 is dialed. Note that no call is established before the user presses **OK**, that is, post-dial.



**Figure 6: Enter number dialog.**

**\* Note:**

Using a shortcut to make a procedure call is not supported while the handset is locked.

---

## System Profiles

A system profile is used to restrict a user from changing certain settings in a handset. The settings require configuration in the **WinPDM** or **Device Manager** and include alarm settings, soft key settings and presence settings. When the system profile is activated, the settings are not displayed in the menu of the handset.

A system profile can be made active in the handset by showing its profile name in idle mode. The system profile can be used in combination with the user profile. If there is conflict between the settings in the system profile and the settings in the user profile, the settings in the system profile are used. If a user changes a setting in the handset menu that is determined by a system profile, the menu is updated but the setting is not changed. If a system profile is to be permanently activated, it is recommended to hide the soft keys menu in the handset. The support for this feature is dependent on the model of handset that is used.

### Example

For example, in the left-hand view of figure, a system profile has been activated and is indicated by the system profile name "Sys Profile SK1" shown in the handset in idle mode. In this case, the soft key "Inbox" and middle soft key "PTT 4" are determined by the system profile settings. If a user, for example, attempts to change the middle soft key name to "PTT 5", by using the handset menu **Shortcuts > Soft keys > Middle** (middle view in figure), the soft key shows "PTT 5" and the setting can be saved. However, the system profile settings are not overridden. When the handset returns to idle mode, the system profile settings are redisplayed, showing "PTT 4" instead of the user changed "PTT 5" (right-hand view in figure).

## Menu operation

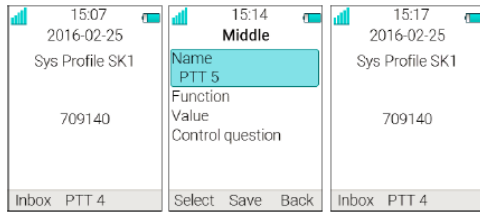


Figure 7: System profile overrides settings changed by the user

## System Profiles Status Indications

The administrator can configure the handset to play a sound if the system profile is activated or deactivated. This provides the user with an audible alert when the system profile changes from inactive to active or vice versa. The feature can be triggered by several kinds of events, such as moving between different parts of a buildings where a system profile might be appropriate in one location but not required in another. The system profile name is displayed when the handset is in idle mode. The user should be aware that the characteristics and behaviour of the handset change when the system profile changes.

---

## Advanced Functions

---

### Admin menu

The system administrators can use the hidden menu in the handset for administration.

The **Admin menu** contains:

- Software, hardware, license information, IPEI/IPDI, and user ID
- DECT link and system information
- Centralized Management status
- Site Survey Tool for indication of radio signal and base station listing
- Fault logging
- Enhanced system menu with ability to alter protection
- Frequency band selection
- Factory reset option

To activate the **Admin Menu**, enter **Settings > Device info > Software** and press the buttons containing CRAFT#, that is **27238#**.

The **Admin Menu** disables after rebooting the handset.

For quick access to the Device Information (DI) menu in idle mode, press the keys containing \*#DI# (that is \*#34#). For quick access to IPEI/IPDI, press \*#06# in idle mode. See the table below.

## Clearing lists in charger

You can set a parameter through the WinPDM or Device Manager to clear messaging lists and call lists that has been stored in the handset.

When the parameter is activated and the function has been downloaded to the cordless telephone, the lists are deleted when placed in a charger. This feature can be useful during administration of handset for new users.

## System Handling

---

### Software upgrade and additional features

You can upgrade the software and additional features or parameters in the handset by using the WinPDM or Device Manager. The following are examples of additional features that you can configure:


- Company phonebook
- Downloadable languages
- Customizing the menu tree

The license(s) can also be added via the **Admin** menu in the handset.

To view the handset's software version, press \*#34# in the idle mode.

---

### Handset updates via the charging rack

Whenever there are updates for the handset, you are instructed to leave the handset in a central charging rack so that the handset can be updated with new features and functions. During an update, the handset displays the  icon and the `Updating handset` message. You can close the message by pressing **OK**.

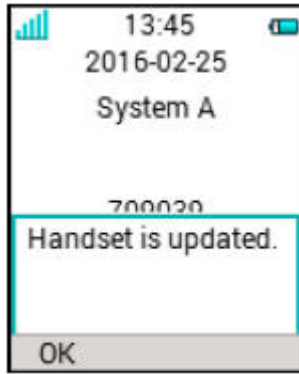


**Figure 8: Handset update while in charger**

If you remove the handset from the charger to use it, the update is suspended. The update is resumed when the handset is again placed into the charger.

When the update is complete, the handset displays the `Handset is updated` message. You can close the message by pressing **OK**.

# Chapter 7: Customizing Avaya 3735 DECT handset

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## Settings

---

### Sound and alert settings

#### Adjusting the ring volume

##### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **Sound & Alerts > Volume**.

Increase and decrease the volume using the left and right arrows on the navigation key.

4. Press **Back** to save the settings.

##### **Note:**

If a handset restriction is enabled, it might not be possible to set the ring signal to **Silent**.

#### Setting different ring signals for calls

##### About this task

Use this procedure to set different ring signals for calls.

The handset has 14 different ring signals.

##### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **Sound & Alerts > Ring signals**.
4. Select one of the following:
  - **Internal call**

- **External call**
- **Call back**
- **Priority call**

You can set different signals for internal calls, external calls, callback, and priority calls.

5. Select the ring signal.
6. **(Optional)** Press **Play** to listen to a ring signal before selecting it.  
The ring signal is repeated until you press **Stop**.
7. Press **Back** to save the settings.

**\* Note:**

Additional ring signals can be selected if they are configured in the WinPDM.

## Setting alerts for messages

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **Sound & Alerts > Message alert**.
4. Select a message alert from the list.

Press **Play** to listen to a message alert before selecting it.

**\* Note:**

The **Play** soft key is not available for Enhanced beep. Instead, send a message to the handset to listen to the sound.

By default, the message volume follows the ring volume setting in the handset. However, you can set the message volume to be different.

5. Press **Back** to save the settings.

**+ Tip:**

The option **Custom sounds** should be selected to create a customized message alert.

## Setting the vibrator alert

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **Sound & Alerts > Vibrator alert**.
4. Select one of the following:
  - **On**

- **On if silent:** The vibrator is on when the handset is muted.
  - **Off**
5. Select vibrating alert.
  6. Press **Back** to save the settings.

**\* Note:**

If the vibrator is activated, it vibrates for incoming calls and messages. The vibrator can also be activated when receiving a message during a call.

## Setting the key sound

### Procedure

1. Press **Menu**.
2. Select **Settings**.
3. Select **Sound & Alerts > Key sound**.
4. Select one of the following:
  - **Silent**
  - **Click**
  - **Tone**
5. Press **Back** to save the settings.
6. **(Optional)** Press **Play** to listen to a key sound before selecting it.

---

## Keypad lock settings

The handset keypad can be locked automatically to minimize the risk of accidentally pressing keys or buttons while the handset is not in use. The keypad is automatically locked after the lock time as per the **Auto lock time** parameter expires.

The administrator can configure the automatic key lock settings in the WinPDM or Device Manager.

**\* Note:**

You can answer or end a call while the keypad is locked. You can call any one of the five predefined emergency numbers while the keypad is locked if this feature is configured in the WinPDM or Device Manager.

The alarm button can be pressed while the keypad is locked.

The user can also configure the automatic key lock settings as described in the following sections. You can configure one of the following options for automatic key lock:

- **On:** Keypad is automatically locked if it is not used before the specified lock time expires.

- **On except calls:** The keypad is automatically locked if it is not used for the specified lock time. If the user is in a call when the auto-lock time expires, the keypad remains unlocked until the user has completed the call.
- **Off:** Keypad is never automatically locked.
- **Auto key unlock:** Keypad is automatically unlocked when a call or message is received. When the user has serviced the call or message, the key lock is reapplied after the specified auto-lock time expires.

The **Auto lock time** parameter specifies the time after which the keypad is automatically locked. The shortest value is five seconds and the longest is three minutes.

The system displays the current key lock setting under **Automatic key lock**.

5. Press **Back** to redisplay the **Locks** menu.

7. Select the required lock time, and then press **Select**.

The user can configure a locked keypad to unlock automatically when a call or message is received. After the user has serviced the call or message, the keypad is locked again after the specified **Auto lock time** expires.

## Deactivating automatic key lock

4. Select **Off** to deactivate automatic key lock.

## Phone lock settings

The handset can be protected for unauthorized use by activating the automatic phone lock. You can configure one of the following options for automatic phone lock:

- **On**: The handset is automatically locked if it is not used before the specified auto-lock time expires, or when it is first turned on. The auto-lock time is specified in the **Auto lock time** parameter.
- **On in charger**: The handset is locked immediately when placed in the charger.  
When removed from the charger and unlocked by the PIN, the handset remains unlocked.
- **Off**: The handset is never locked.

6. Press **Back**.

## Time and date settings

The DECT system is responsible for keeping the time in the handset. You cannot change the time and date displayed in the handset. The time and date formats displayed in the handset can be changed by the user.

The handset also synchronizes with the DECT system time when:

- The handset is turned off and then turned on. The handset requests the current DECT system date and time.
- The handset is turned on for longer than 24 hours. The handset requests the DECT system time every 24 hours from the time it was last turned on.

### Setting the time format

3. Select **Time & Date**.
4. Select the time format. The options are:
  - 12:00 (AM/PM)
  - 24:00

  - DD/MM/YYYY, for example, 17/09/2016 (also called Europe)

- MM/DD/YYYY, for example, 9/17/2016 (also called US)
  - YYYY-MM-DD, for example, 2016-09-17 (ISO 8601)
  - MMM DD YYYY, for example, Sep 17 2016
  - DD MMM YY, for example, 17 Sep 16
  - DD.MM.YYYY, for example, 17.09.2016
  - DD-MM-YYYY, for example, 17-09-2016
5. Press **Select** to save the settings.

---

## Call answering settings

The default setting for the handset is to use the **Off-hook** key to answer a call. However, the handset can be configured to answer the call automatically, that is, without pressing a key and in loudspeaking mode if required. Other keys can also be setup to answer a call. If **Any key** is selected, any key, except the **On-hook** key and the **Sound off** key, can be used to answer a call.

The check box is cleared.

### Maintenance of Batteries

#### Battery Warnings



The "Low battery" icon (  ) is displayed when the battery has 10% or less remaining capacity left. In addition; a warning signal sounds every minute, and the system displays the message "Battery low. Charge now.".

The "Empty battery" (  ) icon is flashing when the battery has 5% or less remaining capacity left. In addition; a warning signal sounds every second, and the system displays the message Battery empty. Shutting down.

During a call, only the corresponding battery warning signal notifies the user. The warning signal cannot be silenced during a call. When not in call, the warning signal is silenced by pressing the **Sound off** (  ) key or .

#### Charge the Battery

Place the handset in the desktop charger or in the rack charger.

The system displays an animated battery icon  indicating charging by starting with its current charge and ending with the full charge. A filled battery icon  indicates a fully charged battery.

#### Note:

Only use the prescribed chargers for charging.

#### Charge Spare Batteries

Spare batteries can be charged with a separate battery pack charger. It can charge six batteries at the same time.

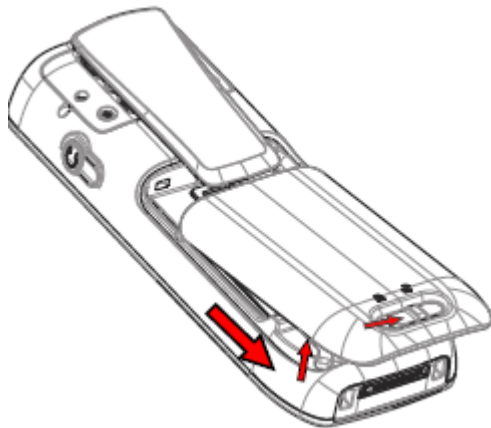
#### Caution:

It is not permitted to charge intrinsically safe batteries using the battery pack charger.

#### Replace the Battery

If the standby time for the handset becomes too low, the battery should be replaced by a new one. For information about new batteries, please contact your system administrator or your supplier. It is

attached inside the battery lid and is connected to the handset in such a way that no misalignment of the contact is possible.

## Easy Replacement of Handset

Easy replacement can be used if a handset needs to be replaced due to, for example, a broken display.

The easy replacement procedure is done via the handset display and the DC4 Advanced Desktop Charger, or the CR3 Charging Rack.

**\* Note:**

Easy replacement is not supported when using DP1 Desktop Programmer.

The following settings are replaced during easy replacement:

- DECT registration
- User parameters (including User ID)
- Contacts
- The extension number is assigned to the new handset.

The following settings are not replaced during the easy replacement:

- Call list
- Messages

## Starting Easy Replacement Procedure


### About this task

This task suggests necessary requirements before starting easy replacement procedure.

## Procedure

1. Check that both the old handset to be replaced and the new replacement handset are of the same device type.

The easy replacement procedure can be used if the old and new handsets have different product licenses, that is, Talker, Messenger, and Protector. The new handset product license is not replaced by the old handset's product license during the procedure. However, a handset product license, can be moved to another handset using the WinPDM/Device Manager.

2. Use the WinPDM or the Device Manager to check that the software of DC4 Advanced Desktop Charger or CR3 Charging Rack is of version 1.3.x or greater.
3. Make sure that the handset batteries are charged before starting the easy replacement procedure.
4. Switch off the new handset by long pressing .


## Easy Replacement Procedure



### About this task

#### Important:

Never remove a handset from the charger until the instructions in the display tells you to do so. If there is an error indication it may be allowed to remove the handset. After the old handset has been in the charger, the new handset must be placed in the charger regardless if the replacement was successful or not. Failing to do so may result in malfunction and the new handset will need to be sent for service.

### Procedure

1. On the new handset, press and hold .
 

Do not release  until you are instructed to do so.
2. Put the new handset in the charger.
3. When the system displays the message "Start phone replacement?", release . Press **Yes** (left soft key).

The system displays the message "Follow the instructions. Each step can take several minutes."

4. Press **OK** (left soft key).
5. When the text "Please insert old phone in charger" is displayed, replace the new handset with the old handset. The handset can either be switched on or off.

If the CR3 Charging Rack is used, the left charging slot must be used for both handsets.

The handset restarts and after a few seconds, the system displays a message "Saving settings. Do not remove phone from charger". It may take several minutes.

**! Important:**

If the old handset cannot communicate with the charger, put the new handset in the charger to restore its settings (the handset's IPDI). If this step is not performed, the new handset must be sent for service. The settings of the old handset can be transferred to the new handset by using PDM or Device Manager.

6. When the system displays the message "Please insert new phone in charger", replace the old handset with the new handset.

The system displays the message "Restoring settings".

**! Important:**

Do not remove the handset while the message "Restoring settings" is displayed.

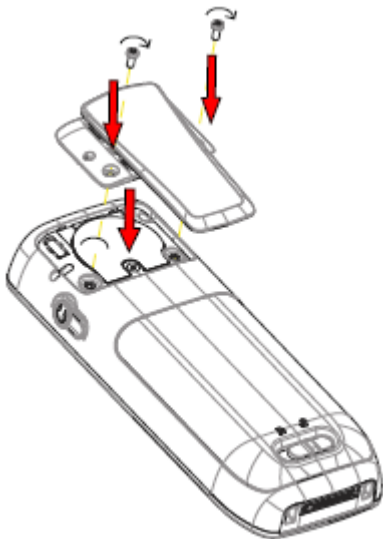
7. When the system displays the message "Phone successfully replaced. Please remove phone to restart.", remove the handset from the charger.

The handset automatically restarts.

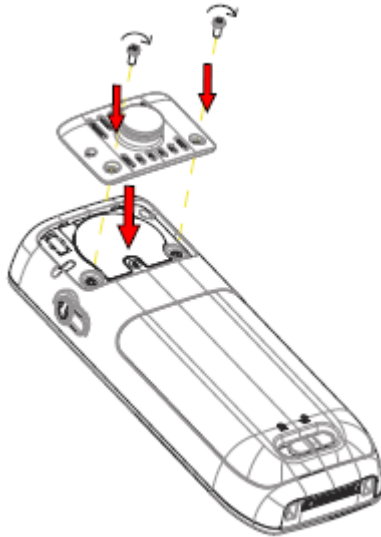
**Figure 11: Screw the hinge—type clip into position**

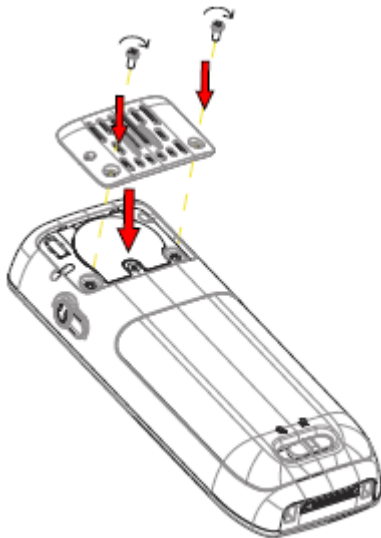


**Figure 12: Screw the swivel—type clip into position**

# Chapter 9: Energy efficiency

Recommendations on how to save energy:

- Do not charge a battery when the ambient room temperature is above +40° C or below +5° C (above 104° F or below 41° F). Charging below +5° C harms the battery and shortens the lifetime.
- Note that storing Li-Ion batteries at high temperature dramatically reduces its capacity. For example storage around +60° C reduces capacity with 20% in less than a month, permanently.
- Set the handset screen saver to the **Black also in call** option. The screen goes black and the backlight is turned off. The backlight also turns off when the handset is in call. This helps to extend the battery life when the user is on an extended call.
- The handset can be configured to switch off when placed in the charger. When removed from the charger the handset switches on automatically.
- If the charger is not used for a longer period of time, remove the power adapter to the charger.
- Do not put the handset in charger when charging is not required.
